



Alongside his ability to manipulate and play with colour, Nick constantly demonstrates his ability to wield light and use the conditions of the landscapes to his advantage. With experience in studying his surroundings in intimate detail, as well as expertly paying attention to the nuances in which the weather changes and adapts, Nick creates a powerful relationship between the observed natural world and the viewer. This connection is at the heart of his work and underlines his photographic identity.

The images featured here are mostly taken in the Alps, a region he has a particular affinity and connection to, which has been his home for the last 10 years. Nick's personal photography projects have earned him awards both nationally and internationally, including from D&AD and Communication Arts. His 2022 publication, 'Unreliable Memories' was shown at UNSEEN Photo Festival and was selected at Photo Espana as one of the best Photo Books of 2022.



The images, developed from over twenty years of portraiture and collage work, explore a range of themes in popular culture, including the role of the individual in fashion, in history, in the artistic imagination and draws inspiration from magical realism, surrealism and symbolism.





Recommended Exhibitions

The 1980s, a decade of mammoth social and political upheaval, has been captured in a new exhibition just opened at Tate Britain. The 80s: Photographing Britain, is a landmark survey which considers the decade as a pivotal moment for the medium of photography. Bringing together nearly 350 images and archive materials from the period, the exhibition explores how photographers used the camera to respond to the seismic social, political, and economic shifts around them.

The exhibition shows how photography became a tool for social representation, cultural celebration and artistic expression Throughout this significant and highly creative period, and traces the work of a diverse crop of photographers, including Syd Shelton, Martin Parr and Brenda Prince, as they document life in the UK against a backdrop of everything from the miners' strike to the Aids crisis.. The 80s: Photographing Britain is at Tate Britain, London SW1 until 5 May 2025.
